

HILL CLIMB CREW IS BANQUETED HERE

LOCAL AGENT SERVES "FEED"
FOR VICTORIOUS CHEVRO-
LET TEAM.

MANY BRAZILIANS ATTEND

Last Day of Newport Hill Climb Sees
Terre Haute Racer Approach
the Hill Record.

J. D. Pollom, western Indiana and eastern Illinois agent for the Chevrolet automobiles, brought back a car load of silver trophy cups that were won by Arthur Chevrolet in the hill climbing contests at Newport yesterday and Wednesday. Mr. Chevrolet added two more firsts to his string yesterday, taking first in Event 15, for cars with a piston displacement of 230 inches and under, his time being 19 2-5 seconds. He also entered his little car in the event for cars having a piston displacement of 300 cubic inches and under, and took first there in 18 4-5 seconds. A crowd estimated at 10,000 witnessed the events.

The Chevrolet tied the big, new 90-horse power Knox racer in this event. Being a regular stock car, the Chevrolet certainly did well, so well, in fact, on Wednesday that several of the stock cars that were to race Thursday failed to enter.

Ralph W. Moss Cup.

The Ralph W. Moss Cup, for cars in the Fifth District, went to M. A. Steele of Terre Haute, driving a big Pope-Hartford up the hill in the fast-time of 24 4-5 seconds. Two equipped Fords were entered in the Ford Free-for-all one taking the hill in 59 2-5 seconds and the other in 55 seconds. A stripped Ford made the hill in 29 1-5 seconds in one of the special county events.

At the conclusion of the meet, Mr. Fox of Terre Haute, owner of the Grey Fox car, attempted to break the record, but because of a change in the approach from last year, was unable to do so. The Grey Fox, Chevrolet, Buick and Knox cars raced in the last free-for-all event, the Grey Fox taking first in 17 1-5 seconds, and the Knox and Chevrolet tying for second.
