

CHEVROLET IN POLICE COURT UNDER ARREST

Famous Chauffeur Held for
Running Auto Without
Number.

Louis Chevrolet, of No. 430 West Thirty-fourth street, world famous as a chauffeur of racing automobiles, and winner of many international events, was to-day a prisoner before Magistrate Cornell in the Jefferson Market Court charged with driving a ninety-horse power racing E. I. A. T. down Seventh avenue near Thirty-fourth street without a number on his auto.

Patrolman Barry of the traffic squad arrested Chevrolet. The chauffeur had worked until after 2 o'clock this morning in the garage at No. 5 West Forty-fifth street, getting his machine into condition to take out to the race course on Long Island to-day for trials. He was on his way to his home to get a heavy coat when arrested. He said that by mistake he had left the number plate of his auto lying on the floor of the garage when he came away.

Chevrolet was held in \$100 bail for trial in Special Sessions, and bail was given by Cornelius H. Tangeman, manager of the garage.

Chevrolet says he may not win the Vanderbilt Cup race Saturday, as his 90-car is pitted against 120 and 130-horse-power motors.

Sheriff Gildersleeve, of Nassau County, to-day swore in 145 deputy sheriffs who will guard the course during the big international automobile race for the Vanderbilt cup on Saturday next.

These deputies, who will be in charge of Sheriff Gildersleeve and Under Sheriff Foster, will be distributed around the course at the most dangerous points, including East Norwich, Jericho turnpike, Phil's Head, Guinea road, Albertson's turn, Lakeville, Hyde Park and Garden City Park.

The rain last night, followed by the clear, brisk weather of to-day, has put the course in first-class condition, and the rival contestants were out in their racing machines and expressed themselves as well pleased with the condition of the course. Heath, the winner of last year's race, and who on Saturday will drive a No. 14 Panhard car, while making a circuit of the course to-day met with a mishap at Jericho Turnpike. He had some trouble with the gasoline tank and had to withdraw the machine for repairs. The damage, it is said, was not serious, and he will start with the machine in the race on Saturday morning.
