

# SPEEDWAY FIELD INCREASED TO SIXTY-NINE NOMINATIONS

Ten Late Entries Arrive—Arthur Chevrolet Backs 16-Cylinder Creation—Earl Sande to Ride in Kentucky Derby—Dave Shade Outpoints Trambie at Armory—Tracy Cox Signed.

**C**OMING IN ON THE LATE MAILS yesterday were ten more entries for the 500-mile race to be held May 30 at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, bringing the total up to sixty-nine, two less than nominated in the 1931 field. However, seven of the number entered last year failed to put in an appearance, when the blanks were accompanied by \$100 checks. This year the fee has been increased to \$200 and is nonreturnable, with 75 per cent of the money to be added to the \$10,000 consolation prize list. Only forty will be permitted to go to the post.

AMONG the late entries was one from Arthur Chevrolet, who in late years has confined most of his efforts to pepping up "flivvers" capable of doing better than a hundred miles an hour. This year the veteran designer has nominated a sixteen-cylinder creation which he will put into shape for the long grind. It is listed as unnamed at present and the pilot has not been selected, but Art can be counted upon to have a man at the wheel who will be out on the bricks with a heavy foot. WHILE interest is picking up in the local gasoline derby, the followers of the thoroughbreds are watching all of the late moves in preparation for the Kentucky Derby to be raced at Churchill Downs next Saturday. The latest "info" coming out of New York is to the effect that Earl Sande will be up on Overtime in an effort to win the blue ribbon event of the turf a fourth time.

Overtime is owned by Mrs. J. H. Whitney and a victory for the veteran jockey would put this popular rider in the undisputed lead. Only one other jockey, Isaac Murphy, ever rode three Derby winners. Sande completed his triple two years ago astride Gallant Fox after winning with Flying Ebony in the 1925 and the great Zev in 1923.

Overtime will be an entry in the race with Stepenfedit, which will have the veteran Buddy Ensor in the saddle. Ensor, staging a comeback after ten years out of the saddle, has never ridden a Derby winner.

The two Whitney colts have been showing promise in pre-Derby races, running two-three behind Evening, a non-Derby eligible, in the Chesapeake at Havre de Grace last Saturday, in which Springsteel, the colt which earlier in the week defeated Tick On, Derby favorite, was badly beaten.
