

NOTED AUTO RACER STOPS IN THE CITY

Louis Chevrolet, the Cobe
Trophy Winner, Dines
at the Anthony.

BUICK MEN PLEASED

In company with all of the high officials of the Buick Automobile company, Louis Chevrolet, undoubtedly the greatest road racer that the automobile world has ever produced, arrived in this city at 12:30, enroute for Flint, Michigan.

Walter Marr, the designer of the Buick; W. H. Little, factory manager, W. C. Durant, former general manager, and H. E. Shiland, general salesman of the company, made up the party. They left the scenes of the big races in Indianapolis early this morning, and expect to spend the night in Adrian, Michigan, resuming the trip to Flint tomorrow morning.

All of the men were pleased with the showing made by their two cars in the great race, although they were not able to land the big prizes as in nearly all former speed events.

Chevrolet seemed to be the merriest one in the party. The big Frenchman was covered with mud, and while the colored porter of the Anthony was wielding the whist-broom on the bespattered garment, Chevrolet gave his opinions on the Memorial Day race, in the following few remarks: "Tuesday's race was the greatest track event I have ever witnessed. It was certainly a success in every way. Only one man killed when there might have been twenty. Four big machines turned turtle in front of the grandstand and I expected to see the drivers dragged out dead. The records made on the brick oval were surely remarkable."

Chevrolet was barred from the 500-mile race by the management of the meet. It will be remembered that he was the winner of the great Cobe trophy race at Crown Point in 1909.
