

HENRY FORD IS TO ENTER SPEEDWAY RACE

INDIANAPOLIS, April 16.—Henry Ford, the Nation's leading automotive magnate, regardless of cost, will make the greatest bid, in the history of the event, to win the International 500-mile automobile sweepstakes at the Indianapolis speedway on Memorial Day, International News Service learned from reliable sources here today.

With money no object, the motor king will enter ten of the swiftest trimmest speedsters that the creative genius of the country's best racing car engineers can turn out. The cost of the venture was approximated at \$750,000.

Ten of the world's most skillful knights of the roaring road will be at the wheels of the Ford entries, to pilot any one of them to victory if it is humanly possible to do so.

Under the watchful eye of the greatest racing car engineer and designer in America, Harry Miller, of Los Angeles, Calif., and with the strictest of secrecy prevailing, the Ford entries are now being constructed in a two-story factory in Detroit. The building is equipped especially for the making of swift, precision-made machines.

Assisting Miller are three men whose names also are famous in automotive engineer circles. They are Arthur Chevrolet, Ernest Wheel, and John Rae, all of whom have helped groom many winners of the famous automobile classic here.
